Statutes of the International Environment Guardianship (IEG)

Article 1: Name, Purpose, and Duration

Name:

The organization shall be called the International Environmental Guardianship (IEG).

Purpose:

The IEG's mission is to promote ethical, equitable, and sustainable stewardship of nature through robust global, regional, and participatory governance frameworks.

IEG is a member-based organisation of Indigenous Peoples (IPs), Local Communities (LCs), and Afro-Descendant peoples (ADs) committed to promoting the conditions for trust and elevating communities and nature-based rights and approaches in present-day nature markets for the benefit of future generations and nature itself.

Key activities include:

- Leading high-trust, human rights, and nature right-based pathways for community representation and participation in nature markets.
- Advocating for transparent time accounting in nature markets.
- Showcasing community market leadership by members.
- Stewarding member data and intellectual property related to nature markets.
- Establishing and maintaining decentralized and inclusive member governance systems.
- Developing and monitoring standards valuation for nature markets.
- Supporting capacity-building and empowerment of member organizations.

Duration:

The IEG is established for an unlimited duration.

Article 2: Legal Form and Headquarters

Legal Form:

The IEG is a non-profit international association registered under [applicable jurisdiction and legal framework, e.g., Swiss Verein or Belgian INPA law].

Headquarters:

The headquarters of the IEG shall be located in [City, Country], with the flexibility to establish regional offices as necessary to advance its mission.

Article 3: Governance Structure

The governance structure of the IEG consists of the following bodies:

- 1. Founding Assembly
- 2. General Assembly

- 3. Global Board of Trustees
- 4. General Secretariat
- 5. Membership Trusted Conduct Ombudsperson
- 6. Council
- 7. IEG Data Trust
- 8. Regional Hubs

Article 4: Founding Assembly

Composition:

- Includes a Chair and six Vice-Chairs representing the seven socio-cultural regions.
- Members of the Founding Assembly are democratically elected from individuals listed in Annex I for a 7-year term, renewable upon re-nomination and approval.

Powers:

- Approving the IEG's statutes and governance principles.
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- Overseeing the development of member policies.
- Overseeing membership onboarding.
- Approving budgets, strategic plans, and policies during the initial phases. Drafting, approving, and monitoring standards for member participation in nature markets.
- Overseeing IEG data, and member data ownership and access rights.
- Promoting safe and human rights-based data sharing amongst members.
- Electing the initial Global Board of Trustees.

Meetings:

- The members of the Founding Assembly convenes at least twice a year. Decisions require a quorum of 50% plus one and are passed by a simple majority. In case of non-consensus, the Chairperson will have a deciding vote.
- Founding Members with active pilot projects in nature markets must abstain from the first vote to approve standards for nature markets.

Removal of a member:

- A member may be removed before the ending of his/her 7-year term under the following conditions:
- Grounds for removal: breaching the ethical and commitment framework.
- Decision process: Requires the agreement of five out of seven members during the annual performance review meeting.

In the event of removal:

- a. Priority is given to candidates from the same socio-cultural region who have been selected from the Council or Global Board of Trustees.
- b. If no suitable candidate exists, the Secretariat will issue a call for nominations from IEG member organizations within the same region.

The Founding Members' Body will elect a new member through a consensus-driven process.

Article 5: General Assembly

Composition:

• The General Assembly is one of the internal decision-making bodies of the IEG, composed exclusively of representatives from member organizations.

Powers:

- · Approving the election of the members of the Global Board of Trustees.
- · Approving the organization's five-year strategic plans.
- · Approving the IEG's annual financial statements and reports.
- · Ratifying the nominations of Regional Coordinators submitted by the Regional Hubs.
- · Reviewing and addressing regional reports and recommendations submitted by Regional Hubs.

Meetings:

The General Assembly convenes twice annually, either physically or virtually. Quorum and final decisions are achieved with the participation of at least 50% plus one of the members.

Article 6: Global Board of Trustees

Composition:

- · Members shall be elected by the IEG Founding Assembly (and subsequently by the General Assembly) with nominations informed by Regional Hubs and will serve a three-year term, renewable upon re-nomination and approval.
 - Representation is drawn from the seven socio-cultural regions and gender balance to ensure diversity.

Powers:

· Setting the global strategic direction of the IEG.

- · Approving major initiatives, including the Vision 2030 Strategy and every 5 years Vision Strategies
- · Ratifying decisions from the General Assembly.
- · Approving the major expenditures.
- · Appointing Data Governance Board

Meetings:

- The Board meets quarterly virtually, with additional meetings as required.
- Monitoring the implementation of rights-based nature market standards and initiatives alongside the Founding Assembly.

Removal:

- A member may be removed on grounds of breaching the ethical and commitment framework via:
- A petition by at least 5 member organizations in the same region; and
- A written request by at least three Founding Members submitted to the Secretariat.

Article 7: General Secretariat

Composition:

 The Secretary-General leads the General Secretariat, categorized as Indigenous Peoples, Local Communities, and/or Afro Descendants, appointed by the founding members, and ratified by the chair.

Responsibilities:

- Managing day-to-day operations, including member communication, recordkeeping, and execution of decisions by other bodies.
- Executing decisions from the General Assembly and Global Board of Trustees.
- Developing membership frameworks, onboarding, and outboarding organizational members.
- Preparing financial reports and coordinating with auditors.

Rechoosing the General Secretariat

The General Secretariat may be removed under the following conditions:

- Grounds for removal: breaching the ethical and commitment framework.
- Decision process: Requires the agreement of five out of eight Founding Members during the annual performance review meeting.

In the event of removal:

- a. Priority is given to candidates nominated by the Founding Members.
- b. If no suitable candidate exists, in the absence of the existing Secretariat, the Council will issue a call for nominations from IEG member organizations.

The Founding Members' Body will elect the new General Secretariat through a consensus-driven process.

Article 8: Office of the Membership Conduct Ombudsperson

Composition:

- · The Ombudsperson is an independent authority tasked with dispute resolution and ensuring adherence to the IEG's Member Code of Conduct.
- The Ombudsperson is appointed by the Founding Assembly for a 3-year term on the recommendation of the Global Board of Trustees.

Responsibilities:

- · Investigating complaints related to governance and decision-making processes.
- · Providing recommendations to the Founding Members' Body, Council, or General Assembly.
- · Mediating disputes within the IEG.
- · The Ombudsperson is appointed by the General Assembly for a renewable term of three years.

Article 9: Council

Composition:

- During the first two years, members are appointed by the Founding Assembly.
- Subsequent Council members are nominated and elected as follows:
 - Each socio-cultural region nominates candidates based on the founding member's TOR.
 - Nominations are submitted to the General Assembly via the Secretariat.
 - Elections prioritize consensus; in its absence, a two-thirds majority vote of the General Assembly applies.

Council members serve a 3-year term, renewable upon re-election.

Chair of the Council:

- Elected by Council members through consensus or majority vote.
- Serves a 3-year term, eligible for re-election.

Powers:

- Ensuring adherence to IEG's statutes and policies.
- Convening General and Extraordinary Assemblies.
- Overseeing organizational policies and procedures.
- Proposing amendments to statutes for the Founding Members.
- Assigning, and publicizing the IEG approval label for rights-based nature market projects.

Meetings:

- The Council meets at least twice a year, physically or virtually.
- Decisions are made by consensus; in its absence, a majority vote applies, with the Chair casting the deciding vote in case of a tie.

Removal:

- A member of the Council may be removed via:
 - o A petition by member organizations and
 - A written request by at least three Founding Members submitted to the Secretariat.
- The Secretariat engages the Ombudsperson for resolution; if unresolved within one month, a call for nominations is issued for a replacement from the same region.

Article 10: IEG Data Trust

Legal Form:

• The IEG Data Trust shall be established as an independent legal entity under the IEG's jurisdiction to ensure transparency, accountability, and a human rights-based approach to data governance.

Purpose:

- · Oversee the application of CARE principles on the governance, security, and management of data and intellectual property related to IEG's activities.
- Ensure equitable access to digital systems and fair and equitable benefit-sharing for member organizations.

· Facilitate innovation and collaboration through responsible data management under TRUST principles and FAIR principles or equivalent regional principles.

Governance:

- · Managed by a Data Governance Board appointed by the Global Board of Trustees for 3 years, with representation from member organizations considered from all seven socio-cultural regions.
- · Annual reports on operations and compliance shall be presented to the General Assembly.

Responsibilities:

- · Develop and enforce policies for data collection, access, and security.
- · Support member organizations with technical assistance and biocultural capacity-building for digital engagement.
- · Maintain compliance with data protection laws, rights of nature, human rights, and ethical standards, and within IEG and Regional Hubs.

Removal of a Member:

- Grounds for Removal: A member of the Data Trust may be removed if found in breach of the ethical and commitment framework.
- Decision Process: Removal requires the agreement of at least five out of eight Founding Members during the annual performance review meeting.

Penalty for Intellectual Property Violations:

- If an assessment investigation by Ombudsperson determines that a Data Trust member has violated the data ownership rights of an individual, community, or group, they shall be subject to a penalty equivalent to the material and moral damages resulting from the infringement.
- The amount of the penalty shall be determined by the designated Ombudsperson, and the violating party shall be obligated to compensate for the damages accordingly.

Article 12: Regional Hubs

Composition:

- · Regional Hubs represent the seven socio-cultural regions and include members from each region's member organizations.
- · Each Regional Hub is coordinated by a Regional Coordinator who acts as the primary liaison between the region and the global governance structures of the IEG.

Regional Coordinator:

- · Regional Coordinators, nominated by the member organizations at Regional Hubs and approved by the General Assembly, also participate to represent the perspectives and priorities of their respective regions.
- The nomination is submitted to the General Assembly's approval.

Term:

· Regional Coordinators serve a 3-year term, renewable upon re-nomination and approval.

Responsibilities:

- · Facilitating communication and coordination among member organizations within the region.
- · Representing regional interests and concerns at the global governance level, including the General Assembly and the Global Board of Trustees.
- Ensuring regional contributions to the IEG's strategic initiatives, including the Vision 2030 strategy, all 5 years of Vision Strategies, and nature market standards.
- · Supporting capacity-building efforts and promoting inclusive participation from regional members.
- · Assisting in the identification and onboarding of new member organizations within the region.
- · Regional Coordinators present two interim regional reports during General Assembly meetings, facilitating the integration of regional priorities into global decision-making.

Powers of Regional Hubs:

- · Facilitating regional coordination and ensuring regional perspectives are integrated into global decision-making processes.
- · Supporting the implementation of IEG's policies, programs, and initiatives at the regional level.
- · Acting as conduits for communication and reporting between regional members and the General Secretariat.
- · Organizing regional meetings and consultations to address specific regional issues or projects.

Meetings:

· Regional Hubs hold at least one annual meeting with its regional member organization's focal person, either virtually or physically, to discuss regional priorities and submit reports to the General Assembly.

Reporting:

· Regional Coordinators submit regular reports to the General Secretariat and the Global Board of Trustees, summarizing regional activities, challenges, and progress toward strategic objectives.

Article 13: Membership

Membership Categories:

· Membership is exclusively organizational and includes NGOs, Indigenous Peoples, Local Communities, Afro-Descendant organizations, academic and science-based institutions, and other entities aligned with the IEG's mission.

Rights of Members:

- · Voting rights as the members of the General Assembly.
- · Participation in decision-making processes.

Admission and Termination:

- · Membership applications that align with the IEG Membership Criteria are reviewed and approved by the General Secretariat in consultation with the Global Board of Trustees.
- Termination of membership may occur due to non-compliance with the IEG's ethical framework or failure to meet membership obligations via:
 - o A petition by at least 5 member organizations in the same region; and
 - A written request by at least three Founding Members submitted to the Secretariat.

Article 14: Financial Oversight and Accountability

Financial Resources:

The IEG's resources include:

· Grants, donations, and philanthropic contributions.

- · Membership fees from organizational members.
- · Revenue from initiatives such as the Vision 2030 strategy.

Transparency:

· Annual financial statements are prepared by the General Secretariat, independently audited, and presented to the General Assembly for approval.

Expenditure Authorization:

· Major expenditures require prior approval from the Global Board of Trustees.

Article 15: Amendments to the Statutes

Process:

- · Any member of the Founding Members may propose amendments.
- · Proposals must be circulated to all members 30 days prior to the vote.

Approval:

- · Amendments require a two-thirds majority vote of the founding members.
- · It must be specified whether the amendment proposal will be discussed and decided upon in the Founding Assembly or, if a decision is needed sooner, through a virtual timely assembly.
- · A virtual timely assembly may take place if at least 80% of the Founding Members approve participation or participate in the process.

Article 16: Dissolution

Conditions:

Dissolution requires a two-thirds majority vote of the General Assembly.

Asset Distribution:

• The remaining assets shall be transferred to non-profit organizations with similar objectives by the vote of two-thirds of the Founding Assembly.

Article 17: Entry into Force

Effective Date:

 \cdot This statute shall enter into force immediately upon approval by the Founding Assembly.

Ratification:

· The statutes shall be signed by the Chairperson of the Founding Assembly and the Secretary-General to formalize their adoption.
